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● CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT UPDATES ●

Chin Page Road Lift Station

The County is partnering with Garney/Freeze & Nichols to begin design of the new lift station and currently working on preliminary site layout and outfall routing.

Slater Road and Page Park Lift Stations

The 90% design of Slater Road and Page Park Lift Stations has been received and is under review. Guaranteed Maximum Price contracts were approved by the board of county commissioners on November 12th and construction is expected to begin in spring 2025.

Wexford Sewer Improvements

The contract with Rummel, Klepper, & Kahl, LLP was approved on November 12th by the board of county commissioners. Evaluations are expected to begin in Q1 2025.

Outfall Improvements Project

The selected bidder is being submitted to the board of county commissioners for approval in January 2025 with evaluations expected to begin in Q2 2025.

Triangle Wastewater Treatment Plant Phase IV

The project team is currently in the process of choosing equipment to put out to bid. The additional design scope has been written and is on the agenda for board of county commissioners review in January 2025.

NC811 - Call Before You Dig

NC811 is the free, easy service that connects homeowners and contractors with the utility providers to mark underground lines in preparation for digging. Whether you are planting a tree, installing a fence, or breaking ground on a major construction project; call before you dig to ensure underground utilities remain operational.

How It Works:

1. Call or Click: Dial 811 or submit a request online at nc811.org.
2. Wait for Markings: Utility providers will mark the location of underground lines with colored flags or paint.
3. Dig Safely: Use the information provided to avoid damaging underground utilities.

Treatment Process Highlight:

Preliminary Treatment

What is Preliminary Treatment?

Preliminary treatment is a crucial first step in the wastewater treatment process, which ensures downstream systems run smoothly and operate effectively. Its primary purpose is to remove large debris, grit, and solids that could damage equipment or hinder subsequent treatment stages.

What does it involve?

This stage typically involves:

- Screening: Removing large objects like plastics, rags, and other debris.
- Grit Removal: Separating sand, gravel, and other heavy inorganic materials that can cause wear and tear on pumps and pipes.
- Flow Equalization: Balancing the flow rate to optimize treatment performance downstream.
